RACHEL, a life-long Frederick County resident, has endured a lot of abuse and hardships throughout her 31 years. Rachel became a new mother 4 years ago and quickly experienced the struggles of being a single working mother. Rachel and her daughter were evicted from their apartment in April 2015 and became homeless. After months of struggling to survive, Rachel and her daughter were able to move into Advocates' Transitional Housing Program in April 2016. Now she has been able to focus on her education and attending FCC fulltime while also working three part-time jobs. Rachel will receive her Associates Degree in Social Work in December 2016.

NILDA moved to Frederick over 20 years ago from Puerto Rico. A few years ago, Nilda left an abusive marriage and found herself alone with 3 young boys and limited financial resources. She was unable to support herself and her 3 boys on her own, and they quickly became homeless; the family stayed in emergency shelters and struggled to survive. Finally, Nilda and her boys moved into Advocates Transitional Housing Program and made tremendous progress. Nilda is now proud to say that she has her own apartment. Nilda continues to work on her goals as an active participant in our homeless prevention program, Families Forward. She regularly meets with her Family Advocate one-on-one and consistently attends Advocates weekly life skills workshops on Thursday evenings. We applaud Nilda and determination.
